Explanation of Terms

Several grant-related terms used to describe project funding are explained on the next page

Grant Project Cost

Grants are awarded to support a specific, connected set of activities, with a beginning and an end, explicit objectives and a predetermined cost. When a funder gives a grant for a specific project or component of a larger project, it generally must be used for that project or component.

In this report, the Grant Project Cost refers to the total cost of the activities for which the City applied for funding to an agency or foundation. It is the sum of the grant award plus the value of the match that is typically, but not always, required by the funder.

Municipal capital work, programs, and services often require more funds than one grant award provides. In such instances, City staff identify one or more components of a larger project, program, or service that qualify for a particular grant opportunity and submit an application. Staff continue to research and apply for grants, and/or request bonding, until sufficient funds are secured to begin implementing the work.

For many of the projects described in the report, the Grant Project Cost is the same as the amount of money needed to fully execute a capital project, program or service. In instances in which additional funds are or may be needed to move forward with implementation, this is indicated in the Funding or Project Status section.

Match/Matching Funds

The match, or matching funds, are a share of costs that the grantee is required to contribute to accomplish the purposes of the grant. It is a percentage that is established by the funder and described in the grant guidelines. Possible match sources are other grant awards; municipal bonding; the value of in-kind donations of goods, services, personnel (aka Force Account) and volunteer time; and City budget. The types of eligible match sources for specific grants are also outlined in the grant guidelines. Note that not all grants require a match.

Calculating Grant Project Cost

Most grant opportunities include a maximum funding request; City staff usually identify a project or component that qualifies, then create a budget based on this amount with the required match percentage. This budget is the Grant Project Cost. For example, if the maximum request is \$500,000 with a required match of 25% of the total grant project cost, then the match amount and Grant Project Cost are calculated as follows:

Lord Cultural Resources presented the final plan draft to the Common Council Laws & Rules Committee in February. It was agreed to move it to the full Common Council for approval. There it was unanimously approved for adoption on March 1. Coordinating implementation of the plan's strategies has begun. Additional funding from NoVo was awarded to fund staffing and strategy implementation.

Project Status as of 05/02/22:

Following extensive public outreach, Laberge Group completed a draft spending plan, which was presented at a public hearing on March 21. A special Finance/ Audit Committee meeting was called on March 30 to review adjustments to the plan, which included moving additional funds into housing. The plan was unanimously approved at the April Common Council meeting.

The City is now seeking an ARPA manager who will coordinate spending plan implementation. Once the project and programs in the plan are fully defined, each will receive its own page in the Grants Activity Update.

It is anticipated that the City will be able to leverage the ARPA award to secure additional funding from other sources for many of the projects in the ARPA spending plan.

A new project manager, Kristin Kessler, was hired in late 2021 to begin developing assessment and administrative systems and program implementation.

An RFP was released for landscape design proposals for the Broadway/Pine Grove intersection green spaces. The goal is to beautify the spaces and support active transportation by encouraging use of the Greenline, which runs through this intersection. Additional funding from another source is needed to cover the design and construction costs.

Kristin has also begun implementation of the food service guidelines strategy, working with 3 community sites to develop food/nutrition policies and other systemic and environmental changes. Our school subcontractor, Cornell Cooperative Extension of Ulster County, has begun working in their first KCSD school to help coordinate a school-level wellness committee. Our early care and education subcontractor, Family of Woodstock, has begun site recruitment and the required NYSDOH trainings prior to implementation.

We plan to renvigorate Play Well next quarter.

Emily Flynn, the Director of Health and Wellness, is focused on multiple transportation projects as part of Travel Well. The Pedestrian and Bicycle Master Plan's public outreach phase is coming to a close. The Transportation Education Campaign has kicked off and we are working with a consultant to craft the best messages to encourage good road-user behavior. A Travel Well Focus Team meeting will be held in May. Bike Friendly Kingston is hosting monthly Slow Rides this summer. Emily is also now the liason for the Complete Streets Advisory Commission.

Heal Well will host a mental health panel on May 5 and an Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) film screening at the Kingston Library on May 10. The distribution of award funds and strategies was finalized in 2022 with funding designated as follows: \$350,000 for the Landlord Ambassador Program to be administered by RUPCO; \$275,000 for a pilot Tiny Homes Project; and \$50,000 for project management. The remaining \$325,000 was redirected to the Kingston Land Bank to cover the hard costs of two buildings undergoing rehabilitation and a Community Stewardship Program.

The City held a public meeting about the Tiny Homes project in March and is now working with Building Safety on designs, energy efficiciency issues, and overall site design. Construction is anticipated in 2022 at 78 Franklin Street and 81 Cedar Street. The grant is now closed.

- a fund for foreclosure prevention counseling.
- a fund to perform 40-year title searches for City-owned vacant property. An RFQ was issued for a title search company, and Wall Street Abstract was selected. Title searches for vacant single family homes have been completed.
- a fund to hire a real estate attorney has been established. An RFP was issued and the work awarded in early 2022. The real estate attorney, Hedgeman Law, will assist in quieting titles on City-owned property, assist in improving the City's "in rem" foreclosure process, and assist the City in enforcing the Zombie Property Law.

Project Summary:

To create a Master Site Plan and make improvements to bleachers, water fountains, fencing and gates, sound and Wi-Fi systems, lighting, bike racks, lockers rooms and bathrooms, and food vending. The parking lot areas will be rehabilitated and repaved using green practices. The site plan may also include efficient bus circulation plans, electric car charging stations, bicycle parking, and bike fix-it stations to encourage sustainable transportation to and from the athletic complex.

Phase 1 (aka Phase A in the engineering report) consists of adding 1,550 feet of new trunk line along Rondout Drive to Murray Street, and 275 of new sewers on Jarrold and Hanratty Streets and Garraghan Drive. This phase is projected to reduce the Hasbrouck CSO to the river by 44 MG per year.

Phase 2 (aka Phase B) consists of constructing a total of 3,540 feet of new sewer lines along Maple St., Stuyvesant St., Dubois Pl., and Murray St. and the installation of storm and sanitary trunklines to facilitate the next phases of sewer separations in the area. The completion of this phase is projected to reduce the Hasbrouck CSO flows to the Rondout Creek by 10 MG per year and provide the backbone for future separations.
